What Is This Course About?

Politics is about more than just what goes on in Westminster. It includes much wider issues about fairness, poverty, discrimination, climate change, war and conflict. We are interested in ideas that are fundamental to society: power, freedom, justice and human nature.

Studying Politics A Level is to understand how the world around us operates. It is always changing, and this is reflected in the classroom. If you want to make sense of current affairs, enjoy thinking about and debating controversial issues then Politics is the subject for you.

What Will I Learn?

Component 1: UK Politics

- How democratic is the UK?
- How fair are UK elections?
- How does the media influence voters?

This paper also includes core political ideas: socialism, liberalism, conservatism

Component 2: UK Government

- Who makes the rules for politicians?
- How powerful is parliament?
- Do judges protect us or undermine democracy?

This paper also includes our optional political idea: nationalism

Component 3: Global Politics

- Globalisation
- The work of the UN and NATO
- Human rights and the climate emergency
- Types of power: superpowers and rogue states

Where Will It Take Me?

With an A Level in Politics, you can progress to degrees in Politics, International Politics/Relations and Political Science as well as related subjects such as History. The study of Politics can lead to a variety of careers within areas such as journalism and **broadcasting**, management, publishing, local government, and public policy, local government and the voluntary sector, as well as politics itself.
